


2022 Annual Report





As we celebrate our 10th anniversary, it's gratifying to reflect on how the George W. Bush Presidential Center has positioned itself as a beacon for the timeless principles of freedom, accountability, compassion, and opportunity. These values underlie the work and legacy of President and Mrs. George W. Bush.

We have laid the foundation for the Bush Center to be a longlasting institution by building thought leadership through our experts, establishing strategic programming, engaging deeply across all constituencies, and ensuring our financial model is sustainable.

Our experts are trusted thought leaders on topics central to the national debate. They have appeared across leading media platforms; counseled presidents and their staffs; testified before Congress; and advised influencers at the federal, state, and local levels. Distinguished fellows such as Dr. Deborah L. Birx; Alex Gorsky, former Chairman and CEO of Johnson & Johnson; former Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam; and former Secretary of Veterans Affairs Bob McDonald have joined the Bush Center.

Clearly, we are creating a sustainable platform.

We launched *The Catalyst: A Journal of Ideas From the Bush Institute* in 2016, with the vision that ideas matter in shaping public policies and spurring action. The quarterly publication is a two-time winner of the prestigious EPPY award from *Editor & Publisher* magazine for best magazine website under 1 million views

Our goal is to bring the Bush Center to the world and bring the world to the Bush Center.

At our signature Forum on Leadership each year, we demonstrate our unmatched convening power by showcasing changemakers to help us highlight and celebrate leadership. We've hosted influencers including Bono, former Secretaries of State James Baker and Condoleezza Rice, and General James Mattis.

Our leadership programs, including the Presidential Leadership Scholars and the Stand-To Veteran Leadership Program, together have more than 950 alumni working across disciplines to steer us all to a brighter future. Our *Engage at the Bush Center* series presented by NexPoint brings influential voices to our stage. Highlights have included Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger, Jay Leno, Lorne Michaels, Jenna Bush Hager, and Barbara Pierce Bush.

We've welcomed almost 2 million visitors to the George W. Bush Presidential Museum and have had an immense economic impact on the North Texas area – around \$2 billion, according to a recent study. We've also worked closely with our partners at SMU to bring prominent leaders to Dallas. like Amazon founder Jeff Bezos.

The Bush Museum promotes a greater understanding of American democracy. More than 10 special exhibits, including President Bush's portraits of our veterans and immigrants, have been on display. This year, our *Freedom Matters* exhibit showcases the evolution of freedom.

We want to build a compassionate society that holds leaders accountable so democracy doesn't waver.

We want young people and veterans to have the tools they need to succeed. We advance the blessings of democracy and free societies by advocating for marginalized populations.

Thanks to your generosity, we will advance these timeless principles far into the future. We've taken giant leaps forward to ensure opportunity for everyone, strengthen our democracy, and advance free societies.

Obviously, none of this happens without our great team and the foundation set by two fantastic predecessors, Ambassador Mark Langdale and Secretary Margaret Spellings. Plus, our indefatigable board chair, Secretary Don Evans, who continues to lead as few can.

For the past decade, the George W. Bush Institute has become a trusted source for civility and sensible solutions to the issues of the day and beyond.

We've hosted events and written on a range of issues from immigration and elections to educational assessments and the war in Ukraine. In a deeply polarized time, we stay focused on ensuring opportunity for all, strengthening our democracy, and advancing free societies. We offer recommendations for policymakers in Washington, D.C. and at state and local levels.

We've developed a reputation as a place for reasoned discourse.

I'm proud of the milestones we've reached. We spent five years working with four school districts to determine how to retain good principals. In a series of in-depth reports, we've made specific recommendations for school districts to evaluate their principal talent management policies and practices. Our findings from this work have been shared at a national level, including a complete toolkit and resources that are available on our website, and our education experts are called upon to speak to these regularly.

As the Bush Institute has grown, so has our work on veteran transition. Team 43 became a community of veterans who lean on each other after participating in the Warrior Open golf tournament and Warrior 100K bike ride. *Check-In* – a tool for veterans and their families to easily connect to nocost, high-quality mental and brain health care – recently surpassed 1,000 connections. The Bush Institute's Veteran Wellness Alliance released a first-of-its-kind standards report for clinicians in 2020 on how to deliver high-quality mental and brain health care. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs shared the report with its networks and encouraged its clinicians to consider the findings.

Our experts remain a trusted voice on the impact and success of the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR). To date, PEPFAR's work has saved more than 25 million lives. *Go Further*, the innovative public-private partnership among PEPFAR, the Bush Institute, UNAIDS, Merck, and Roche also continues to see great success in screening women living with HIV for cervical cancer in sub-Saharan Africa.

The Bush Institute began to lay the groundwork in 2011 for what is now known as our Ensuring Opportunity portfolio, in which we explore economic development policies that help cities

and towns reinvent themselves as engines of mobility. We also promote reading and literacy to ensure all young Americans have access to gainful employment and to examine students' readiness for their next move in life.

The Bush Institute remains committed to strengthening our Nation's democracy while shining a light on disinformation and reasserting the value of civic participation and civility.

In 2022, we hosted *Elections: A More Perfect Union*, an event highlighting the integrity of our elections and acknowledging the vital work carried out by election workers.

We also support democratic values around the world by elevating institutions that serve their people and promote universal human rights. Our Freedom Collection, started in 2009, documents the stories of those who led or participated in freedom movements around the world, such as the Czech Republic's Vaclav Havel and Liberia's Ellen Johnson Sirleaf. We've stayed the course in highlighting the critical work of activists and the need to push back against authoritarian threats through a conference in November 2022 and with a new series called *The Struggle for Freedom*.

We know communities thrive when women are equal participants. To this end, we call out autocrats who strategically leverage the oppression of women and girls in Afghanistan and the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region, and we advocate for their freedoms. Our experts are also tackling the threat of corruption and kleptocracy to democratic societies.

We stand firmly with Ukraine in its valiant effort to preserve its freedom and independence against Russia's unprovoked and unjustified invasion.

None of these milestones would have been possible without a trusted team and my predecessors Holly Kuzmich and James K. Glassman. And thanks to your generous support, we remain committed to finding ways to help Americans and people around the world find a path that upholds democracy and promotes civility.

GEORGE W. BUSH PRESIDENTIAL MUSEUM

The Bush Museum's permanent exhibit promotes a greater understanding of the American presidency and examines the consequential time during which President and Mrs. Bush served.

Since opening 10 years ago, we are proud to have welcomed over 1.9 million visitors through our doors. The museum offers a moving exhibit on September 11, 2001, a replica Oval Office, and an interactive experience in presidential decision-making. The museum is also host to a variety of temporary exhibits that delve deeply into unique topics and provide insights that only a presidential center can offer.

THE BRADFORD M. FREEMAN GALLERY

The Bradford M. Freeman Gallery complements the permanent exhibit by offering special exhibits that give insight into American government and history and important cultural aspects of American society.

Past exhibits have included President Bush's original paintings that tell the stories of veterans and immigrants; humor in the White House; presidential retreats; the role and influence of America's first ladies; the history of U.S. campaigns and landmark elections; and baseball's relationship with America's presidents and its personification of America's social struggles.

The 2023 special exhibit, *Freedom Matters*, uses rare artifacts, historical documents, interactive activities, and personal perspectives to examine the concept of freedom. Artifacts include a 14th century copy of the Magna Carta and rare versions of the Declaration of Independence, Constitution of the United States, and Bill of Rights. Through these significant historical documents and the stories of those who have fought for freedom, the exhibit explores the importance of building peaceful, stable democratic societies and reinforces the civic responsibility of the individual in advancing freedom and liberty.

LAURA W. BUSH NATIVE TEXAS PARK


The 15-acre Laura W. Bush Native Texas Park reflects President and Mrs. Bush's love of the native Texas landscape, their long-standing commitment to environmental conservation and restoration, and their belief that the Bush Center should contribute to the everyday life of nearby communities while enhancing the experience of visitors.

The landscape, designed by Michael Van Valkenburgh Associates, contributes to the Bush Center's ambitious sustainability objectives by increasing biodiversity, restoring native habitats, reducing the need for irrigation, and employing an organic maintenance program. These significant landscape achievements helped the Bush Center building, designed by Robert A.M. Stern and Associates, earn Platinum-LEED certification.

By using native plants and a careful stormwater management plan, almost all on-site water is reused, and irrigation demands are reduced by more than 50%. A 252,000-gallon cistern collects rainwater to irrigate more than 900 trees, 400 of which were transplanted from the Bushes' Prairie Chapel Ranch in Crawford, Texas. The native lawns are a blend of five drought-tolerant grasses, while the prairie and savannah areas are planted with different native grasses and wildflowers.

The Bush Center grounds are open to all. Visitors can enjoy a 1 mile network of paths punctuated by benches and bridges that provide places to stop and observe the landscape through the seasons. The Carolyn and David Miller Amphitheater offers a place to sit and convene, and partially shaded lawns create inviting public spaces for relaxing, picnicking, and playing. In the spring, the Rory Meyers Meditation Garden is a great place to take in the rich palette of wildflowers, including Texas bluebonnets, the state flower. In the fall, visitors experience the annual monarch butterfly migration through North Texas. The Native Texas Park's many milkweed plants, an endangered plant species, attract the butterflies, which use them as a food source and breeding location to lay eggs.

EXPANDING GLOBAL IMPACT

Ruba Rihani, a 2018 WE Lead scholar, was abandoned by her parents when she was 4 years old and sent to boarding school. Because of her difficult past, Rihani dedicated her life to improving the lives of Arab women and founded the Arab Woman Today Center in Jordan. During her time in the Bush Institute's WE Lead program, Rihani learned vital lessons in leadership that she applied to her work to advance economic opportunity for Arab women.



Rihani is one of 81 women from Afghanistan, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, and Tunisia who have completed the WE Lead program. WE Lead is one example of the Bush Institute's steadfast commitment to advancing free societies by helping improve the lives of women and girls through education, opportunity, health, and leadership development.

Advancing Free Societies

In 2017, the Bush Institute hosted a national forum in New York focused on freedom, free markets, and security featuring Secretary Madeleine K. Albright, Ambassador Nikki Haley, and Secretary Condoleezza Rice. Bridging domestic and global policy work on democracy, the event was marked by the release of a call-to-action paper outlining recommendations to strengthen democracy and extend the spirit of liberty at home and around the world.



Honoring Human Rights and Democracy

On June 23, 2016, President Bush presented Dr. Oscar Elias Biscet of Cuba with his Presidential Medal of Freedom. Dr. Biscet, who was jailed as a prisoner of conscience in Cuba from 2002 until 2011, was awarded the medal in absentia in 2007 for his dedication to advancing

members of parliament, educators

and women's rights advocates.

Inspired by Mrs. Bush's longstanding dedication to democratic change in Burma, the Bush Institute launched the Liberty and Leadership program in 2014 to help young Burmese leaders gain the knowledge and skills they need to lead during a democratic transition. Seventy-nine men and women completed the program including former political prisoners



leaders such as President Tsai Ing-Wen of Taiwan during an event in Dallas to assess threats to freedom and offer recommendations on ways to advance the cause of liberty in 2022. Following the event, The Struggle for Freedom monthly series rallying support for democracy and human rights activists abroad was launched.



Supporting Afghans

TELLING A STORY WITH PRESIDENT BUSH'S PAINTBRUSH

President Bush painted Kim Mitchell and shared her story of perseverance in his latest book, Out of Many, One: Portraits of America's Immigrants, which reminds us of the countless ways America has been strengthened by immigrants who came to the United States in search of a better life.

Mitchell's journey began in a Vietnamese orphanage where she was adopted by American Airman Ken Mitchell during the Vietnam War. She became a U.S. citizen in 1976, grew up in northwestern Wisconsin, and was drawn to join the U.S. military like her father. After graduating from the United States Naval Academy, she served 17 years in the Navy, was a White House Military Social Aide under two administrations, and worked for the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Today, she is an advocate for veterans and military families and is a Senior Advisor for the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

Former Lieutenant Commander Mitchell is a 2019 alum of the Bush Institute's Stand-To Veteran Leadership Program, which aims to increase the impact and develop the skills of those who serve our Nation's veterans and military-connected community. Since 2018, 176 scholars have completed the program, including active duty servicemembers, veterans, and civilians,

Presidential Partnership

President George W. Bush and President Bill Clinton launched the Presidential Leadership Scholars program, a partnership with the presidential centers of George W. Bush, William J. Clinton, George H.W. Bush, and Lyndon B. Johnson, in September 2014. The first-of-its-kind program teaches the skills necessary to work across political divides and lead lasting, positive change in communities across America and the world.



Economic Strength in Central America

The lack of economic opportunity, combined with violence and corruption, has caused many Central Americans to flee their homes. The Bush Institute-SMU Economic Growth Initiative has been engaging with leaders in Guatemala, Honduras, and El Salvador to economically strengthen the region since 2018. In 2022, Guatemala and El Salvador adopted digitization policies resembling recommendations the Bush Institute released in 2020.

The Role of First Ladies

First ladies play an important role in promoting women's education, health, and economic empowerment. In 2013. President and Mrs. Bush along with Mrs. Michelle Obama were in Tanzania to speak with African first ladies across the continent about strengthening the region.



Economic Mobility in American Cities

To kick off the Bush Institute-SMU Economic Growth Initiative, a full-day conference exploring how American cities can better promote economic nobility was held in 2019. Cullum Clark, Director of the Bush Institute-SMU Economic Growth Initiative, has since published policy recommendations and testified before city and state governments. Clark has also appeared in outlets such as Freakonomics, The conomist, and Bloomberg.

Education is an urgent civil rights issue in America. President and Mrs. Bush met Tatu Msangi during a 2008 trip to Tanzania. During the visit, Tatu shared she discovered she was HIV positive while pregnant with her daughter, Faith. Thanks to the treatment made possible by the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), Faith was born without the disease and is now 17 and thriving. The virus is virtually undetectable in Tatu now, too.

The naturalization ceremony complements the Bush Institute's immigration work, which advocates for smart, skills-based immigration reform.

Supporting North Korean Refugees

The Lindsay Lloyd North Korea Freedom Scholarship was established in 2017 to help North Korean escapees and their children pursue higher education and build productive, prosperous lives Developed after the Bush Institute conducted a needs assessment on North Korean refugee communities, the scholarships are granted to students for vocational school, community college, university, and graduate-level studies. To date, a total of \$229,500 has been awarded in scholarships.

The PEPFAR Legacy Continues

PEPFAR built up a health infrastructure in recipient countries which allows programs like the Bush Institute's Go Further partnership to tackle cervical cancer. President and Mrs.

Bush visited Windhoek Central Hospital in 2017 to tour their cervical cancer screening and treatment room and meet with survivors of HIV. Generosity and ompassion have allowed EPFAR and programs like Go Further to save

Tools for Veteran Transition

In 2019, the Bush Institute started Check-In - a tool to easily connect veterans and their families to high-quality mental and brain health care. Now available in all 50 states and Washington D.C., over 1,000 veterans and their families have used the tool and nearly 400 have received this no-cost, compassionate health care




2022 USES*
